

Professor Emeritus of English at Eastern Michigan University, Clayton Eshleman is an internationally acclaimed poet, essayist, editor, and translator whose books include *The Grindstone of Rapport: A Clayton Eshleman Reader* (Black Widow, 2008), *The Price of Experience* (Black Widow, 2012), and, forthcoming, *Penetralia* (Black Widow, 2014). Notable among his many translations into English are *The Collected Poetry of Aimé Césaire* (with Annette Smith, University of California, 1983), as well as two more recent translations, published by Wesleyan University Press, of Césaire's *Solar Throat Slashed* (2011) and the original 1939 version of *Notebook of a Return to the Native Land* (2013). With A. James Arnold, he is preparing a bilingual edition of *The Complete Poetry of Aimé Césaire*, to be published by Wesleyan in 2015.

On this occasion, Professor Eshleman will read from his translation of the unexpurgated 1948 edition of Césaire's volcanic collection Solar Throat Slashed. Martinican poet, playwright, historian, essayist, and political leader Aimé Césaire (1913-2008) was the co-founder of the Negritude movement and a major shaping force in New World poetics.
