His books include Scheherazade in England: A Study of 19th-Century Criticism of the Arabian Nights; The Postcolonial Arabic Novel; Anglo-Orient; Arabic Poetry: Trajectories of Modernity and Tradition; Reading Iraq; The Islamic Context of the Thousand and One Nights; and Islam in the Street. Among his forthcoming books is Arab Popular Revolutions: Staging Collective Will. He was the recipient of the 2002 Owais Award in literary criticism.
