Princeton Review Ranks QC a "Best College" for 27th Consecutive Year

In what has become a ritual of summer, QC is featured in Princeton Review's latest "Best Colleges" guidebook, which took note once again of our high-quality academics, affordability, and diversity. Although the number of institutions that earn this distinction varies from year to year, OC has been included in every edition since the title was first published in 1992. Princeton Review wasn't alone in giving QC high grades. Money named QC in the magazine's "Best Colleges for Your Money" rankings, terming the school "a great investment." Meanwhile, Forbes placed QC on its most recent list of America's "Best Value" colleges. Forbes assessed the colleges in the following categories: net price, net debt, alumni earnings, timely graduation, school quality, and access for low-income students.

President Elected Board Chair of HACU, Receives NAACP Award

President Félix V. Matos Rodríguez was elected board chair of the Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities (HACU), announced the HACU Governing Board on November 2. "We are honored to have Félix Matos Rodríguez serve as chair of HACU's Governing Board," notes HACU President and CEO Antonio R. Flores.

"The work HACU does each and every day has had an immeasurable impact on Hispanic students both in the United States and abroad," says Matos. "From the internships and scholarships they provide to the careerdevelopment programs that help ensure students are prepared to enter the workforce, HACU's vital support for Hispanic students has never been more necessary."

HACU, established in 1986, represents more than 470 colleges and universities committed to Hispanic higher education success in the United States, Puerto Rico, Latin America, and Spain.

Every year the local branch of the NAACP—now celebrating its 75th anniversary—gives an award to an individual who has made efforts to advance racial relations, health, and justice. On Saturday, March 17, Matos was the honoree, being recognized for the work he does to attract all kinds of students to Queens College.

Gary Ackerman Donates Papers to QC



Ackerman

Former U.S. Congressman Gary Ackerman '65 is donating his personal papers to the Benjamin S. Rosenthal Library. The papers and material will be arranged and described by the college's archivists and made available to researchers as one of the school's growing number of Special Collections. A representative of the country's most diverse constituencies in Queens and Long Island's North Shore, Ackerman was reelected to Congress 15 times before retiring from public

service in January 2013. By placing his papers in the Rosenthal Library, Ackerman hopes that they will be studied by generations of researchers in the context of his political career in the borough.

The Ackerman collection includes 12 boxes of material containing personal and professional papers that tell the story of his political career; photographs, albums, and scrapbooks; original audio and video material in various formats; and other objects and artifacts, such as campaign memorabilia. Eventually the material will be digitized and made available online. (Some exceptions will be made based on privacy concerns.)

"As a child of immigrants, I benefited enormously from the opportunity to attend and graduate from Queens College," said Ackerman. "I can never fully repay the debt of gratitude to the college for equipping me for the challenges that were and still are to come. I am delighted to contribute my personal and professional papers to my alma mater with the hope that this at least satisfies the requirement of the papers that were overdue."

"These papers have a tremendous public research value, as well as pedagogical value to the Queen College faculty and students. We are thrilled with this gift and can't wait to make the materials available to our community," said Queens College Chief Librarian Kristin Hart.

Another Grammy for Arturo O'Farrill

Arturo O'Farrill '05 picked up his fourth Grammy Award earlier this year in the category of Best Instrumental Composition for his work *Three Revolutions*. He had won a Grammy in this category in 2014 for the *Afro Latin Jazz Suite*, as well as winning two Grammys for Best Latin Jazz Album: *The Offense of the Drum* (2015) and *Song for Chico* (2011), A 2005 graduate of the Aaron Copland School of Music, O'Farrill earned an MA in jazz performance. He says he benefited from the influence of distinguished

former music school faculty member Sir Roland Hanna, who bridged European classical music with American jazz, as well as having studied composition with Grammy-nominated professor Michael Mossman. O'Farrill is among the many QC alumni and faculty who have been nominated for over 100 Grammy Awards (winning more than 30) during the past 50 years.

Focusing on a Legendary Music Professor



Rathaus

Celebrated in pre-WWII Europe as one of the most promising new voices in classical music and the first serious German composer to write film scores, Karol Rathaus saw his fame diminish after his forced immigration to the United States. Several American orchestras commissioned pieces from him, but on this campus, his colleagues and students were unaware of his European fame; he was best known as a beloved professor of composition.

Now, a filmmaking team associated with QC—producer Lev Deych (Physics) and his sons, co-directors Daniil Deych '08 and Sergei Deych '11—is working on a documentary, *Discovering Karol Rathaus*.

The Deyches discovered Rathaus while preparing *Music for the Barbed Strings*, their multimedia program about Jewish composers who lived, worked, and, in many cases, died under the Nazi and Stalinist regimes. "We talked to Michael Haas, an expert on the subject of music lost under the Nazis," recalls Sergei, a pianist who holds a master's degree from the Aaron Copland School of Music. "Haas told us, 'You're sitting on a gold mine at Queens College, which has the Rathaus collection"—the composer's family donated his papers and recordings to the college's library.

After learning about Rathaus and listening to his music, the Deyches were drawn to his story. As Soviet emigres, they feel kinship with someone who fled persecution and rebuilt his life somewhere new. They have outlined a movie that will incorporate archival material, commentary from people who knew Rathaus, visits to all the places he lived in Europe, and performances of some of his pieces. Some interviews have already been filmed, including one with Professor Emeritus of Music Alexander Kouguell, who knew Rathaus. "This movie is a work in progress," observes Daniil, who majored in physics and film studies at QC and then went to Vancouver Film School. "Any project takes a lot of time."

While neither a musician nor a cinematographer, Lev, in his free time from teaching and research, moonlights as a producer, putting together live music shows for the 92Y and Brooklyn Public Library, as well as producing a few of his sons' music videos. He shares Sergei's and Daniil's commitment to completing the documentary, and has refined an elevator pitch to share his enthusiasm with

Tech Incubator Means Business

With 24 active startups, a third of them owned by QC alums, the college's Tech Incubator is a hub of activity. In addition to the use of shared facilities--such as conference rooms, classrooms, and a well-equipped resource center--members enjoy the synergy of working among fellow tech entrepreneurs. "I'm trying to build an ecosystem of entrepreneurs, mentors, advisors, and investors, so companies can get the support they need and help each other," says Ying Zhou, the incubator's executive director. QC students are involved as interns, facilitators, and instructors; they taught computer classes at QC's summer camp and at the incubator. Workshops open to the general public include Design Your Learning, which focuses on core skills in communication, decision making, and other areas. Paulette Mullings Bradnock '84, chief auditor of BNY Mellon, is returning to campus as a member of the college's board of trustees.

A native of Jamaica, West Indies, Mullings Bradnock graduated from QC with a BS in Accounting. She began her career at Chemical Bank, holding roles in both audit and control functions. In 1993, she moved to Chase, where she successively covered global services, investment management, and private banking.

After Chase's acquisition of J.P. Morgan and merger with Bank One, she was given audit responsibilities for the corporate functions at JPMorgan Chase, including finance, legal, real estate, and human resources

In 2005, Mullings Bradnock became deputy director of internal audit at AIG, assuming global responsibility for audits across financial services, general insurance, and corporate functions. Five years later, she was appointed senior vice president and director of internal audit, the top audit role at the company, where she managed 400 employees.

Mullings Bradnock joined BNY Mellon in 2015 as chief auditor, with global responsibility for internal audit. She is a member of the company's operating committee and reports directly to the audit committee of the board of directors.

Named one of the women to watch on American Banker's list of the most powerful women in banking in 2017, Mullings Bradnock serves on the board of governors for the Institute of Internal Auditors New York Chapter. She is also a member of the board of directors of the Make-A-Wish Foundation of Metro and Western New York, and chairs its audit committee.

Students Develop App-titude

The academic year had yet to begin when 26 incoming QC freshmen reported to campus for Google's Computer Science Summer Institute Extension program--a 15-day intensive course that covered software and programming fundamentals. Selected through a competitive process, participants in the first QC-CSSI program learned the basics of HTML, JavaScript, and databases and took a field trip to the Google New York City offices.


During the last three days, the students were split into threeperson teams to design, develop, and deploy apps of their own. At a final event held on August 15 in the QC Dining Hall Patio, the students presented their projects, including Moosic, an app that allows users to select playlists based on their mood; Money Mappers, an app that helps users budget their money into specific spending categories; and Fridge.io, which can notify a user when groceries are set to expire. Many of the students plan to continue developing their apps and took suggestions from the audience on how to improve them.





Trading Their Way to the Top

The students outperformed 929 teams from 327 schools in a test of trading savvy, growing a virtual \$500,000 account into \$2.6 million. Their efforts earned an Apple iPad Pro and \$3,000 in a TD Ameritrade brokerage account for each of them, and a cash award of \$30,000 for QC--proof that education pays off.

Queens College Legacies

An outstanding public institution shapes the destinies of parents and children

In 1982 Christine Timm, a divorced mother on welfare, took a step that would reverberate throughout her life: she enrolled at Queens College. Timm earned a BA in music in 1988. Through a college friend, she met her future husband, Robert James. Then she changed gears, earning a master's in English at QC in 1991 and a PhD from the CUNY Graduate Center. Timm was also establishing a family legacy. Her three sons—seen with her on the cover of this magazine—would embrace QC as their best academic fit.

In higher education, the word "legacy" evokes brick-and-ivy private schools where family tradition and a well-directed donation smooth entry for the next generation. But for Timm's family and many others, the dream school is Queens College. "I don't think I would have a better job if I had paid the big bucks," says Timm, a tenured English professor and assistant department chair at Westchester Community College.

"Queens College helped launch all of our careers," reports Mark Klein '76, who met his wife, Laurie, while in college. QC was in her family's DNA. "My sister and brother-in-law went to Queens College, got into Columbia Dental School and became dentists," she says. Mark earned a BA in sociology at QC and an MSW in South

Carolina; he has worked for more than eight years at QC's Center for Career Engagement and Internships, after running employment programs in the nonprofit sector. Laurie tapped QC for a master's in education, then taught in Forest Hills for 28 years.

The Kleins encouraged their son, Robert, to enroll in their alma mater. Majoring in computer science and math, he received a partial scholarship and a three-year Jeannette K. Watson Fellowship. "He had three internships in different sectors," comments his proud father. "He matured." Robert, class of 2004, earned a master's in management and systems at New York University and is now director of information technology at CUNY's Guttman Community College.

Dietician and single mother Jennifer Chapler says three of her four children—David, Elizabeth, and Marissa—found QC to be "the perfect place to pursue an education and prepare for a meaningful career." They attended college with the help of Joseph Tauber Scholarships, awarded by Chapler's union, Local 1199-SEIU, to members' eligible children. In a bonus, David and Elizabeth met their spouses here.

David, a 2012 psychology graduate, works at Northwell Health and, armed with an MBA, hopes to move into health administration

and finance. Elizabeth, Macaulay Honors College at Queens '13, studied neuroscience, earned a master's degree, and is a physician's assistant in the internal medicine and cardiac unit of Montefiore Medical Center. Marissa, Queens '14, is a speech and language pathologist at a skilled nursing facility. "CUNY colleges, and Queens, provide students with the opportunity to pursue the education that they want and to achieve their goals, while still living within their financial means," says Elizabeth.

Eliyahu Perl '15, an MD/PhD candidate at University of Cincinnati College of Medicine, says his family's QC connections were determined by proximity. "My grandmother lives a block away from Queens on 70th Street, so I guess that's what started the tradition," Perl observes. Queens prepared his mother for dental school and his aunt for teaching. His brother, also an alumnus, studies medicine in Israel.

Perl's parents gave him a choice between Yeshiva University and QC. "I wanted the diversity, and I felt I'd have more freedom at Queens," he recalls. He graduated as valedictorian with a BA/MA in philosophy, a BS in biochemistry, and minors in classics and biology. "I got to experience a lot," continues Perl. "Today, at a world-class institution like Cincinnati Children's Hospital, I was doing experiments that I learned in a molecular biology course with Dr. Timothy Short at QC."

Josephine Parascandolo and David Gailing met at QC while pursuing master's degrees in music, she in piano and he in clarinet. "We came to Queens College because of the reputation of the music department and its professors," says Jo Gailing, who had earned her music baccalaureate at QC. She teaches music with the New York City Department of Education; her husband, an optometrist, plays clarinet professionally.

Their daughter Lisa received an Advanced Certificate in Educational Leadership in 2015 at QC and is a DOE site supervisor. Their daughter Erica graduated from QC in 2014 with a BM in

violin, stayed another year to study viola, and graduated from the Juilliard School in 2017 with a master's in viola performance. "We are very grateful for all the opportunities Queens College has given us," notes Jo Gailing.

Timm shares that sentiment. Having postponed college, she matriculated when her son reached kindergarten age. "QC was the one school that offered a five-year music ed program where you came out with a degree and a credential that you could use in the school system," she explains. Her firstborn, Guy Norbury '00, now teaches English at Westchester Community College.

Timm's middle son, Jackson James, an Irish fiddler, chose QC for the same reasons his mom did. "He gets a good education and a degree he can use to get a teaching job," she says. Now her youngest son, Dylan James, has enrolled at QC. While he plays banjo and mandolin in the Irish music scene, he is also keenly interested in

science. He recently interned in the lab of Stephen Pekar (Earth and Environmental Sciences), the college friend who introduced Timm to Dylan's dad so long ago.

"It has become a tradition,"
Timm says of QC. Whenever she
visits campus, "it's a little like going
home again."

BEQUEST

- A bequest is made by naming the Queens College Foundation in your will or living trust.

- Your bequest gift will be exempt from state and federal estate tax.

LIFE INSURANCE

■ If you designate the Queens College Foundation as the beneficiary of a life insurance policy, the proceeds will not be subject to federal or state estate taxes.

■ Transferring ownership of a life insurance policy to the Queens College Foundation during your lifetime may qualify you for an income tax charitable deduction. In addition, if your policy is not fully paid, your future premiums would be tax deductible.

RETIREMENT AND ANNUITY ACCOUNTS

- By naming the Queens College Foundation the beneficiary of a retirement account, you can make a gift that will benefit the college and reduce or prevent taxation of the account—likely to be one of the most heavily taxed assets in your estate.
- You can designate the college as the beneficiary of all or a portion of your IRA, 401(k), 403(b), Keogh, SEP, or other qualified plan by contacting your plan administrator.

DONATING FROM YOUR IRA

- People older than 70½ can transfer up to \$100,000 per year from a traditional IRA to the Queens College Foundation. This would count as the required minimum distribution and would not be taxable.
- The transfer would essentially lower the taxable income for the following year.

CHARITABLE GIFT ANNUITIES

- With a transfer of \$10,000 or more, you can establish a charitable gift annuity which will pay you (and/or a loved one) a fixed rate for life with the remaining balance being used to support Queens College.
- You will receive an immediate income tax charitable deduction for a portion of your gift.

Example of language for a bequest is given to support the general purposes of Queens College or to support a specific department or scholarship:

"I give, devise, & bequeath to the Queens College Foundation, a private, not-for-profit 501(c)(3) tax-exempt organization, having as its principal address Queens College Foundation, 65-30 Kissena Boulevard, Flushing, New York 11367-1597 [(the sum of _______dollars) OR (______% of my residuary estate)] for [(the college's general charitable purposes) OR (the use of the _______department)]."

Recently, loyal alumni, faculty, and friends have been especially generous in their estate plans. These donations will have a lasting impact and contribute to the future success of Queens College, and we are truly grateful.

A consistent donor to Queens College, Lalita Palekar '60 was a biology major who went on to serve as a scientific review administrator at the National Institutes of Health. In the fall of 2016, Palekar reached out to express her appreciation for the excellent

education she received at her alma mater and to make arrangements to establish a scholarship with a gift from her estate. Through a bequest, she created the Lalita D. Palekar Endowment Fund. Each year, her endowment supports graduate and undergraduate students who are engaged in research in the natural sciences, with preference given to biological research.


A psychology major with a minor in theatre, John W. Pereira '75 joined QC's Department of Drama, Theatre and Dance as an

adjunct associate professor in September 1978. During his 37 years of teaching, Pereira was admired by his students and respected by his peers and colleagues. He often worked and taught in the Little Theatre, located in Rufus King Hall. Pereira left a substantial donation from his estate to support the college's greatest needs.

Adam Halicki Conrad, an assistant professor at QC and published author, continued his studies as a lifelong learner on campus. He left the majority of his estate to Queens College in honor of his late wife, Ellen LiBretto, who graduated from QC in 1967 with a degree in anthropology and again in 1970 with a Master of Library Science. LiBretto had a career at the New York City Public Library and was, like her husband, a published writer. Conrad listed Queens College as the beneficiary of his retirement annuities. His transformative gift of over \$8 million was used to establish a professorship at the Graduate School of Library and Information

Studies, a large scholarship endowment for GSLIS students, and funds to support the greatest needs of Queens College.

During World War II, Thomas Mattia '43 was second in command of a battleship. In recognition of his great valor and service to the United States, he received numerous medals, including a Purple Heart. He was also a Fulbright Scholar. Mattia taught history in Great Neck public schools for over 60 years. To honor his remarkable life and career, his dear friend Julius Diaz created an endowed scholarship. Each academic year, the scholarship is awarded to student veterans at QC, keeping Mattia's legacy alive.

No pledging required

OPEN HOUSES

Imported from City College, house plans played a significant role in QC social life from the 1950s to the 1970s. House plans were single-gender associations similar to fraternities and sororities, but less exclusive. Interested students could sign up in the fall semester at the annual Central House Plan Tea & Smoker, a showcase of available options. To rush a plan, you subsequently attended its individual tea or smoker—tobacco wouldn't be banned on campus for decades—and joined or didn't. "If you wanted to be a member, it was almost impossible not to become a member," says Philip Blustein '68, who belonged to politically oriented Power House and still keeps in touch with his Power-ful friends. Any ten students, freshmen included, could form their own house plan if they had a faculty advisor and a constitution. At one point or another, more than 70 houses were

active on campus, hosting everything from dances, intramural sports, and talent shows to concerts. The Central House Plan also sponsored events, such as a champagne ball and a partially subsidized trip to an off-Broadway show. 

Queens College turned 80 last year, and like any spry octogenarian, we couldn't stop celebrating. Here are some highlights (clockwise, from the left).

On October 11, 2017—exactly 80 years after the college opened its gates—QC toasted itself with a cocktail reception in Thiele Atrium. To get the party started, a combo of Aaron Copland School of Music faculty and graduates played standards from the '30s and '40s, and a pair of QC students performed dances from the period. President Félix V. Matos Rodríguez emceed; Queens Borough President Melinda Katz read a proclamation honoring QC; Governor Andrew Cuomo and Mayor Bill de Blasio each sent congratulations; and Barry Bryer, chair of the Queens College Foundation, presented the President's Medal—the college's highest honor—to awardwinning WINS reporter Juliet Papa '78 for her many services to her alma mater. Everyone applauded another notable alum in

attendance: WWII veteran John Kinder, a member of QC's first graduating class and the only person in the room who was present on the college's first day of classes.

On November 27, the festivities moved south to Washington, DC: President Matos joined Congresswoman Grace Meng, who made an entry into the Congressional Record about QC's anniversary. In particular, Meng cited the college for promoting diversity and investing in the success of its students.

State and local legislators also saluted QC. In Albany on June 12, with President Matos in attendance, the New York State Senate and Assembly issued proclamations co-sponsored by Senator Toby Stavisky and Assemblymember Nily Rozic in honor of the




college's landmark year. At City Hall just five days earlier, the Queens County delegation had issued its proclamation to mark the college's anniversary. Pictured with President Matos are (from left) four of the borough's City Council members, all of them proud

QC alumni: Council Member Rafael L. Espinal Jr. '06, Council Member Rory I. Lancman '91, Council Committee Chairman Costa Constantinides '05, and Council Member Robert Holden. Indeed, QC was the subject of so many proclamations that they merited a page of their own on the college website: www.qc.cuny.edu/about/ Glance/80/Pages/Proclamation.aspx.

QC-which admitted equal numbers of men and women in its first class—has a proud history of achievement in women's

basketball. As QC's head coach, Lucille Kyvallos garnered national recognition for the Knights, and women's sports in general. She compiled a record of 239-77 at the college, mentoring Gail Marquis '73, who won a silver medal as a member of the U.S. women's 1976 Olympic basketball team, and Donna Orender '78, who served as commissioner of the Women's National Basketball Association. On October 14, 2017, QC held a court dedication ceremony for Kyvallos in FitzGerald Gymnasium in front of a squad of her friends (from left: Vice President for Student Affairs Adam Rockman, Sharon Beverly, Barbara Riccardi, Eileen Mentone, Maggie Hilgenberg, Gail Marquis, Donna Orender, Sherry Fitelson, Catherine Andruzzi, Kyvallos, President Matos).

Ask students just entering college what careers they may envision for themselves and you'll receive a lot of different responses. One you're not likely to hear, however, is, "I'd like to someday become a college president." Nevertheless, over 80 years of graduating scores of future scientists, accountants, historians, schoolteachers, musicians, librarians, artists, and more, Queens College graduated nine people who did eventually become college presidents.

Among the surviving members of that group, three agreed to speak about their QC experience. None anticipated becoming a college president. But all of them, despite having earned advanced degrees at other institutions, believe QC was indispensable to their later successes.

Helen Heineman

President Emerita, Framingham State University (1999–2006)

Helen Heineman's father, Joseph Kliegl, one of the inventors of Klieg lights, believed that girls should not go to college. He wanted Helen to go to secretarial school, as her older sister had done. But when the Queens Village native graduated from Jamaica High School with a 94 average—which under prevailing policies entitled her to attend QC for free—she told her father, "I'm going."

"Going to Queens College was life-changing," she says. "It was a most wonderful place," where faculty took an extraordinary degree of interest in their students. Feedback from instructors in her English studies convinced Heineman to make another life-changing decision: switching her major from Music to English. "I had a wonderful mentor in the English Department, Dr. Dwight Durling. . . . I owe my academic life to him."

Heineman graduated class valedictorian, summa cum laude and Phi Beta Kappa in 1958. Durling encouraged her to pursue graduate studies. When she cited her father's reluctance to pay for them, Durling urged her to apply for a Woodrow Wilson Fellowship. She received one, allowing her to pursue her MA at Columbia University. Subsequently, with offers from Berkeley, Yale, and Cornell, she opted to go to Cornell for her PhD. "I also met my husband there."

Of all her education, Heineman most credits Queens College for her academic and professional accomplishments. "[Columbia] had wonderful teachers, but they just lectured and nobody [students] spoke," she observes. "I don't think I would have developed in the way that I did at Queens had I gone there first."

In September 1999, following a long teaching career and a couple of stints as vice president and interim president, Heineman became the first female president of Framingham State College [later University], but not before again having to overcome male reservations about an appropriate role for a woman. "The trustees said they wanted a strong CEO type," she scoffs, without explicitly noting their glass-ceiling mentality.

A sweeter vindication, however, had come many years earlier. In 1967 when Heineman received her PhD, her father, then quite elderly, took notice. "He sent me a note with a \$100 bill in it that said, 'I really am very proud of you. Love, Daddy.' That meant a lot to me."

Ed Ray

President, Oregon State University, 2003-present

Edward John "Ed" Ray grew up literally a stone's throw from Queens College on 162nd Street and 65th Avenue in the Electchester complex, built by the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers to provide affordable housing for union members. Through his dad's membership, the family moved from Jackson Heights to Electchester. "I was the youngest of three sons," Ray says. "We had no money to buy anything or do anything. So, I lived at home and I went to Queens College where I got a great education."

He says his experience at a school funded by the people of New York City allowed him to appreciate the similarly public-spirited land grant college concept that underpins Ohio State University, where he served for 33 years as provost and executive vice president, and Oregon State University, where he has been president for the past 16 years. In 2015-16, he adds, "I ended up becoming the chairman of the board of the American Association of Colleges and Universities, and that's a long way to go for a kid from 162nd Street."

It's also a long way to go for someone as uncertain of a career objective as Ray initially was at QC. "I ended up as a Math major in my senior year with minors in Economics and Theater, but I had this incredible, broad-based arts and sciences education. It shaped my attitude toward higher education, its value and its transformative effect."

Among significant faculty influences he recalls Robert Dierlam, head of the Speech Department. In a required speech class in which nearly all the students had pronounced New York accents, Ray says he stood out for his surprising lack of one—a trait he attributes to the fact that his father was from Arkansas and New Mexico. Dierlam urged him to try out for a campus play, The Detective Story.

"I was the only one who didn't sound like a New Yorker," says Ray, who got the part. "I was supposed to be from some exotic place called Ann Arbor, Michigan. I was in about five or six plays in my last two years and over the summers."

Ray received his BA in Mathematics in 1966, graduating cum laude and Phi Beta Kappa, and subsequently received both his MA and PhD in Economics from Stanford University. "When I got to Stanford, I didn't feel that I was having any difficulty holding my own with students from Berkeley and Harvard and elsewhere. I felt like I belonged."

Daisy Cocco De Filippis

President, Naugatuck Valley Community College, 2008-present

Born in the Dominican Republic, Daisy Cocco De Filippis immigrated to the United States reluctantly. "My parents had been divorced, my mother remarried, and I was very attached to my maternal grandmother, who really was my teacher," she recalls. "But I came [at age 13]. I found out that women have wonderful opportunities here and I fell in love with this country."



A Flushing High School graduate who at 17 was married, with a baby son, De Filippis worked as a bank teller; at age 20, she enrolled at Queens College. She and her husband, also a QC student, scheduled classes so they could share childcare responsibilities. DeFilippis had two more children, taking off two semesters for the birth of each child. She estimates it took about five years to complete her degree, which she received in 1975 summa cum laude and Phi Beta Kappa.

"We were like a tribe of immigrants who couldn't believe that Queens College was tuition-free, that it was such a beautiful place," she says. "I was encouraged, nurtured, and mentored in so many ways by the faculty." It was perhaps their example that led her to form a particular ambition: "I thought that if I could become a college professor, I would have the dream of all dreams."

She feels a particular debt to Bette Weidman, with whom she took courses on women in literature and American literature. "I was very shy and quiet. She brought me out to speak in class to participate. . . She encouraged me to find my voice, to be myself. I took every course I could with her; I loved the way she taught-not only me, but also the other students, who were encouraged and respected and included. It was amazing." Weidman has remained in touch with De Filippis throughout the latter's academic career, which would include six years as provost and vice president for academic affairs at Eugenio Maria de Hostos Community College, CUNY. "Weidman would come to hear me give talks when I first became a professor. We write to each other."

Rafael Rodriguez, a Puerto Rican professor in Latin American literature, gave her, she says, perhaps the most valuable insight into being a good educator. "Rafi made the class about who we were." Years later, teaching at York College when the 9/11 attacks took place, De Filippis recalled how Rodriguez had addressed in class the news of the suspicious deaths in September 1973 of Chilean President Salvador Allende and Chilean poet Pablo Neruda. "Let the students talk about how they feel and you supplement the discussion with some literary readings. That's what I did after 9/11. I had

> learned from Rodriguez that the student is not only in the class for the Spanish or for the literature but as a whole human being in a society in a moment in history."

Rodriguez also introduced her to the work of the Dominican Poet Laureate Pedro Mir and gave her a book of his poems when she graduated. "He said to me, 'How can a Dominican girl not read Dominican authors?"" When De Filippis later went to the CUNY Graduate Center to pursue her PhD, Mir was the subject of her recitation; her dissertation was a semiotic study of three decades of Dominican poetry in the 20th century. It was the university's first dissertation on a Dominican topic by a Dominican student.

A reluctant immigrant to the United States as a young girl, Daisy Cocco de Filippis says, "I found out that women have wonderful opportunities here, and I fell in love with this country."


