Students are encouraged to use available electives to complete a dual major, minor, pre-requisites for graduate or professional school, or complete and internship, experiential learning and/or study abroad. Students are encouraged to use their available general electives wisely and focus on coursework that will assist them personally, academically and professionally.

\*\* If one or more of these courses is not offered, students should consult the Italian Undergraduate Advisor or a department representative for enrollment in a different advanced 200 and/or 300-level course.
