- --Students are <u>strongly</u> advised to meet minimum grade requirements in pre-requisite courses <u>before</u> taking upper level coursework.
- --A grade of C is required in each of these classes before progressing to the next required course in the sequence. A grade of C in PSYCH 1073 & PSYCH 1071 is required to register for 213W. A grade of C in Psych 213W is required to register for Advanced Experimental Psychology.
- --Students may only repeat PSYCH 1071 & PSYCH 1073 and PSYCH 213W one time.





^{*} It is better to first choose which two upper (300-level) electives interest you, and, then, look at what lower (200-level) electives serve as their pre-requisites. This will help you determine which lower electives to take first that satisfy pre-requisite requirements for the 2 upper electives you want to take. PSYCH 214, 221, 232, and 243 serve as pre-requisites for many upper electives.
