\* It is better to first choose which two upper (300-level) electives interest you, and, then, look at what lower (200-level) electives serve as their pre-requisites. This will help you determine which lower electives to take first that satisfy pre-requisite requirements for the 2 upper electives you want to take. PSYCH 214, 221, 232, and 243 serve as pre-requisites for many upper electives.

**POLICIES:**

The required minimum total of Psychology credits is 36 (at least 18 must be taken in-residence at QC).

**Minimum grade requirements:** A grade of C or better in PSYCH 101, 1073 & 1071, 213W and Advanced Exp (311-321) is required. Psych electives require a grade of C-

**Special rules for 1073/1071, AND 213W:** You may take each course two times maximum. This policy applies to everyone. Psych majors who do not earn a C in these courses within two takings will not be able to continue as a Psych major.

**\*\*Core course sequences:** Students must meet minimum grades before progressing in the sequence. A grade of C in PSYCH 1073 & 1071 is required to take 213W. A grade of C in PSYCH 213W is required to take Advanced Experimental.

A maximum of 9 credits for any combination of the following courses can be applied toward the major: PSYCH 372, 373, 391, 392.

\*\*\*General Electives: Students may complete general electives by taking courses in (most) department/s or programs they choose; however, depending on the course/program, students may need department permission and/or prerequisite course/s. Electives may be used to supplement the chosen major (an English major may want to take a course in French or Italian literature) or to fulfill interest in a different area (a Music major may be interested in the physics of sound). Students are encouraged to use available electives to complete a dual major, minor, pre-requisites for graduate or professional school, or complete and internship, experiential learning and/or study abroad. Students are encouraged to use their available general electives wisely and focus on coursework that will assist them personally, academically and professionally.
