

MINUTES OF THE ACADEMIC SENATE OF QUEENS COLLEGE - MAY 27, 1971
Academic II - Room 170

1. The Chairman, Eugene Fontinell, called the meeting to order at 3:40 p.m. Reconvening of meeting of May 20, continuing with May 13, agenda. Chair asks consent to receive announcement from President Murphy.
2. President Joseph S. Murphy:

"According to the BHE Bylaws an appropriate election body is interpreted to mean 30 percent. According to the Queens College Elections Committee report, less than 30 percent of those students eligible voted in the elections of May 1971. Under authorities of the BHE the president is authorized to delegate powers and duties as deemed appropriate."

Therefore, President Murphy delegated authority to the following persons to constitute student representation in the Academic Senate of Queens College for 1971-72:

3. Return to Stein's resolution. Chair informs Senate that this resolution is open to amendment only by adding nonmodifying matter.

4. MOTION: (Nussdorf)

"To limit debate on entire report to one hour."

Motion to limit debate fails.

5. MOTION: Duly made (Warren) and seconded:

"Recruitment by all branches of the American armed services on the Queens College campus shall be forbidden."

Point of order (Mansfield):

"This is a modifying amendment, and hence not proper."

Chair rules Warren amendment out of order.

6. (Kershaw) proposal - amendment to Stein's motion on placement services - add:

"This does not preclude the right of other individuals or groups to provide similar information."

Accepted as a friendly amendment by Stein.

7. MOTION: Duly made (Hyman) and seconded:

"The Placement Bureau shall publicize all recruitment sessions intended to procure full-time employees. This notification will consist of conspicuous advertisements in the campus media for five consecutive weeks prior to the recruitment session. If the Placement Bureau receives a petition signed by ten members of the Academic Community requesting that a recruitment session be given as an open forum, that session will be held as an open forum and scheduled by the Placement Bureau in consultation with the recruiter. The petition must be received within fourteen calendar days after the first public announcement of the recruitment session. Individual interviews may be given after each forum. The place, date and time of each recruitment forum shall be conspicuously advertised in the campus media for two consecutive weeks prior to the forum."

Point of order (DeVito):

"This is modifying material and should not be allowed."

Chair rules that this is a proper amendment. "If this Body accepts it, it is then open to debate whether it is wise or not wise. This is a condition for recruitment."

(Neurath) appeals ruling of the Chair.

Deputy Chairman (Stahl) assumes the Chair.

Chair is overruled.

8. Call for final vote on the following:

"Effective immediately, the Placement Bureau shall schedule such interviews and career information services as it deems appropriate to the needs of the student body. This does not preclude the right of other individuals or groups to provide similar information."

Point of information (Brown):

"What is the intent or meaning of the Stein resolution?"

Chair expressed opinion, not challenged by the Senate, that the Stein resolution was, in effect, equivalent to "open recruitment."

(Syrett) asked for roll-call vote. Passed by 1/3 of the Body.

Roll-call vote: 44 For - 43 Against (see attachment).
Chair verifies that vote is official.

9. MOTION: Duly made (Warren), seconded and passed:

"Resolved that the Academic Senate of Queens College file a statement with the appropriate legislative and administrative authorities strongly protesting the spirit and substance of Public Laws 91-303 and 91-441. Further, that the Academic Senate and the administration of Queens College make a concerted effort to bring about the repeal of Public Laws 91-303 and 91-441."

10. MOTION: Duly made (Asro) and seconded:

"Academic Senate recommends that the Placement Office shall be required to provide printed information concerning all groups seeking to recruit on campus. Further, recommends that this information will be obtained from sources other than those supplied by recruiting groups and will be accessible to any member of the college community."

11. MOTION: Duly made (Capaldi), seconded and passed:

"To proceed immediately to the next item on the agenda - annual reports of the standing committees."

12. MOTION: Duly made (Capaldi), seconded and passed:

"All annual reports not requiring Senate action be submitted to the secretary for inclusion in the Minutes."

13. MOTION: Duly made (Kershaw), seconded and passed:

"To accept the Bookstore Committee report."

14. Report of the Elections Committee (Friedman).

MOTION: Duly made (Paul), seconded and passed:

"Ties in the election are to be resolved by a lottery."

Mr. Drew conducted a lottery in which Mr. Neuberger is the Delegate, and Mr. Shore the Alternate for the Physics Department.

15. MOTION: Duly made (Eilbott), seconded and passed:

"To seat the faculty members elected to the new Senate."

16. MOTION: Duly made (Tannenbaum), seconded and passed:

"To seat those members of the Art Department who were elected."

17. MOTION: Duly made (Nussdorf), seconded and passed by unanimous consent:

"Whereas Professor Eugene Fontinell, through his tireless efforts, has provided leadership and direction for the Academic Senate as its Chairman in its crucial first year, and
Whereas Professor Eugene Fontinell has shown dedication to the ideal of true faculty-student community at Queens College, in both word and deed, and
Whereas Professor Eugene Fontinell has worked diligently for the betterment of Queens College,
Be it resolved - that the Queens College Academic Senate expresses its deep gratitude and appreciation to Professor Eugene Fontinell, and
Be it further resolved - that a scroll inscribed with these sentiments be presented to Professor Eugene Fontinell."

18. MOTION: Duly made (Gilbert), seconded and passed:

"To adjourn, sine die, the first session of the Queens College Academic Senate."
