MINUTES OF THE ACADEMIC SENATE OF QUEENS COLLEGE - DECEMBER 16, 1971 Academic II - Room 170

- 1. The Chairman, Eugene Fontinell, called the meeting to order at 3:30 p.m.
- 2. Chair announced the election of the following faculty Alternates:

3. MOTION: Duly made (Rosenfeld), seconded and passed:

"To suspend rules to modify Agenda."

MOTION: Duly made, seconded and passed, the following Resolution:

"The Academic Senate representing the faculty and students of Queens College calls on the Governor and the State Legislature to continue undiminished support for the City University of New York.

The health of this vital institution and its ability to serve the people of the City and State of New York, must not be impaired by shortsighted cuts in appropriations."

4. MOTION: Duly made (Fields), seconded and passed:

"To elect two faculty and one student to fill three seats on Commission on College Organization."

Pauk registered a protest against President's Commission on College Organization:-

"I would like to register one Senator's protest at the President's use of the Academic Senate for his own purposes. Contrary to his pledge to rely on the Senate as the governing body of the College, he has made a mockery of the Senate by appointing a Committee to restructure the College bypassing, the Senate's right to elect all the members of such Committee. Students are particularly spited by this action by President Murphy, since, under Senate rules, a Senate committee could have 50% student representation."

Chair ruled Pauk out of order, since this should be brought up under "New Business."

5. The following students were nominated from the floor for the Commission on College Organization:

MOTION: Duly made, seconded and passed:

"To close nominations."

Mark Litwak elected to the Commission on College Organization.

The following faculty were nominated from the floor for the Commission on College Organization:

Irwin Mandel, James Warwick, Peter Chabora, Raymond Franklin, Mircea Oprea, Seymour Goodman, Carl Hiller, Stephen Schwerner, Mary Holford.

MOTION: Duly made, seconded and passed:

"To close nominations."

MOTION: Duly made (Fields), seconded and passed:

"In the absence of an absolute majority for one or two of the seats, the next four highest would be in the run off."

Vote for two out of four: Mandel, Schwerner, Hiller, Chabora.

Hiller withdrew.

Vote for two out of three: Mandel, Schwerner, Chabora.

Mandel and Schwerner elected to the Commission on College Organization.

6. MOTION: Duly made (Mandel), seconded and passed:

"To have the next regular meeting on Thursday, February 3, 1972."

"The Academic Senate requests the President to transmit to the Board of Higher Education the Senate's request for Board of Higher Education response to the Senate's Resolution of April 15, 1971, for modification of matriculation requirements for students in the School of General Studies."

b) MOTION: Duly made (Warren), seconded and passed:

"To accept annual report of Elections Committee for 1970-71."

Notice of Intent (Alsop): "To change the Bylaws in order to prevent persons from serving on both the Academic Senate and the Faculty-Student Disciplinary Committee."

The Elections Committee will be holding open hearings on the advisability of rewriting the elections portion of the Governance Report.

Chair: "If anyone has any specific proposals or modifications, they must be made before the Elections Committee establishes their procedure. Must have proper notice. If procedural recommendations, there must be a majority vote."

MOTION: Duly made (Pauk), and seconded:

"When the Elections Committee has decided upon the procedures to be followed in the spring, before acting upon those procedures, they should be presented to the Senate for advice and consent or approval."

Chair ruled amendment out of order since it is a Bylaw change and requires written notice to be made seven days before meeting at which it is to be voted on.

"To recommend to the Elections Committee to report at the February meeting on the procedures proposed for the spring election."

b) Campus Life Committee -

MOTION: Duly made (Mansfield), seconded and passed:

"To adopt the following Drug Policy statement for Queens College:

The following is an expression of the sense of the Academic Senate:

The legislature of the State of New York and federal statutes have made the possession, sale, or purchase of certain drugs without proper authorization a crime.

All members of Queens College are expected to abide by the laws of the city, state, and federal governments (Board of Higher Education Bylaws, Article XV, Section 15.1). The College will not serve as a sanctuary and cannot insulate its members from the consequences of illegal acts. Queens College will not protect students or other members of the College community from prosecution under the law.

Individuals who choose to use, sell, purchase, or keep illegal drugs in their possession must be prepared to accept complete responsibility for their actions."

 - b) Campus Life Committee (continued)

Amendment by addition to the Drug Policy statement (Litwak), as follows:

"Whereas: The Academic Senate in no way advocates the use of marijuana or violation of the present laws, but feels the prohibition of marijuana causes more harm to society than the drug itself.

Whereas: Similar to alcohol prohibition it has lead to an increase in organized crime and has diverted law enforcement officials from crucial areas, such as violent crimes and the trafficking of hard drugs, known to be harmful.

Whereas: When large segments of the population openly violate such unpopular laws this tends to weaken respect for the law in other areas.

Whereas: Extensive research by the National Institute of Mental Health has shown that marijuana does not lead to harder drugs, that it is not a cause of major or violent crimes and all evidence as of today indicates it is no more harmful than more popular drugs such as tobacco, birth control pills, alcohol and aspirin.

Be it resolved: That the Academic Senate opposes the current marijuana laws in principle, as unrealistic and overly punitive and in need of reform."

Chair indicated that amendment can be defeated as an amendment, but reintroduced as a main motion.

Litwak withdrew amendment.

MOTION: Duly made (Litwak), seconded and failed:

"To suspend rules to modify agenda for amendment to the Drug Policy statement."

9. Unfinished Business:

Dave Fields, Deputy Chairman, assumed the Chair.

a) MOTION: Duly made (Pauk), and seconded (Holford):

"That the Academic Senate shall review the faculty's relationship to the Faculty/Staff Newsletter and its faculty Editorial Board."

Parliamentary Inquiry (Axelrad) - requested Chair to rule on the legality of the Motion.

Chair ruled Motion in order.

MOTION: Duly made (Fleshler), seconded and passed:

"To table Pauk Motion."

"To adopt the 45 credit M.A. Program" (see attachment)
