November 11, 1993

- 1. 3:45 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. A briefing was given by Assistant Provost Hratch Zadoian, at the request of the Executive Committee, regarding the status of the School of General Studies, and Evening Students. Mr. Zadoian took questions.

 - b) (D. Pecoraro) requests the Executive Committee look into the reapportionment in the Academic Senate regarding the changes in student population in the Day, Evening, SEEK, Graduate and ACE categories.

6. Special Motions:

a) MOTION: Duly made (Krasner), and seconded:

"To adopt the following resolution:

- Whereas, Chancellor Anne Reynolds has been disingenuous in presenting the Goldstein Report to the CUNY faculty as a plan designed to enhance the academic potential of the colleges, rather than a plan to consolidate the university and establish unwarranted centralized power in her own hands; and
- Whereas, Chancellor Reynolds, despite overwhelming CUNY-wide rejection of the report, sought and received from the Board of Trustees, powers enabling her to implement, unilaterally, the objectives of the Goldstein Report; and
- Whereas, through the "enemies list" reported in the Cole memorandum of June 25, 1993, Chancellor Reynolds seeks to use public monies to reward or punish those campuses and college presidents who comply with or refuse to comply with her guidelines; and
- Whereas, recent statements and actions by the Chancellor and her deputies, including statements by Vice-Chancellor Freeland made at Queens College on Wednesday, October 27, demonstrate that the Chancellor continues to press aggressively for the concentration of power over programs and curriculums in her own hands; and
- Whereas, recent actions of the central administration with regard to budget allocations and other matters demonstrate that the policy of punishing Queens College for opposition to the Chancellor's policies and practices continues to this day; and
- Whereas, these actions by the Chancellor violate academic freedom and collegiality as well as ordinary standards of fairness and will undermine the standards and integrity of Queens College and the City University;
- Resolved, that the Academic Senate of Queens College vote NO CONFIDENCE in Chancellor Reynolds and recommend to the Board of Trustees that she be removed from her position as Chancellor of the City University of New York."
