

Themis Brown Memorial Lecture



Themis Brown Memorial Lecture sponsored by the Center for Byzantine & Modern Greek Studies of Queens College

Being diasporic animates multiple affiliations. It involves connections with immigrant history, the historical homeland, the new home as well as other diasporas. This talk explores how Greek Melbourne places its cultural identifications in relation to the cultural and political fabric of its city as well as Greece and Australia, drawing examples from Greek Australian poetry, murals, photography, painting, institutional practices as well as cultural and political activism. Yiorgos Anagnostou is the Miltiadis Marinakis Professor of Modern Greek language and qulture at The Ohio State University. His research interests include diaspora and American ethnic studies, with a focus on Greek America. His published research covers a broad range of subjects, including film, documentary, ethnography, folklore, literature, history, sociology, and public humanities. He is the author of Contours of White Ethnicity: Popular Ethnography and the Making of Usable Pasts in Greek America (Ohio University Press, 2009 (Greek translation from Nisos, 2021)) and is a co-editor of Redirecting Ethnic Singularity: Italian Americans and Greek Americans in Conversation (Fordham University Press, 2022). Since 2017 he is the editor of the online journal Ergon: Greek/American Arts and Letters (http://ergon.scienzine.com/)

Studies in Modern Greek Literature: The Novel/Forms of Fiction

Studies the development of the form of the novel in Greece, including texts ranging from the nineteenth century to the present. The discussion will entail the aesthetic features of individual works and relate them to larger literary movements and social, cultural, and historical contexts. The Center's interdisciplinary BA is unique in that it offers students the opportunity to study the range of Greek history from medieval to modern times. While the Center is invigorated by numerous students of Greek ancestry and its location in the largest Greek American community in the United States, the program welcomes students from all walks of life and backgrounds.

Career Options

Graduates with a major in Byzantine and Modern Greek Studies have the ability to analyze, critique, and research language, literature, history, and culture. They are well-prepared to enter the fields of education (at all levels), archive and information management, library cataloging, languages and translation, cultural heritage, journalism, media, and art (including museum curatorship).

Byzantine and Modern Greek Studies should be of special interest to those students who have either a cultural or professional interest in the Greek experience, and to those seeking to understand a culture and a civilization other than their own. Because the Program draws from several disciplines, it offers insights into the unity of knowledge. The Program is also an excellent choice as a second major and provides the background for graduate work in Byzantine and Modern Greek Studies, among other disciplines.



Study Program Information

The Center's program in Byzantine and Modern Greek Studies offers a structured body of courses drawn from the Division of Arts and Sciences and the Division of Social Sciences, leading to a BA in Byzantine and Modern Greek Studies. It is designed to provide a detailed knowledge of the Greek people's history, language and literature, institutions, customs, and culture. Program offerings are divided into four categories:

Byzantine Studies

The Program offers courses and seminars on The History of the Byzantine Empire, Byzantine Culture and Civilization, and Byzantine Art.

Modern Greek Studies

The Program offers courses and seminars on Modern Greek Culture and Civilization, The History of Southeastern Europe, Modern Greek History, The Formation of the Modern Greek State, The Economy of Greece, The Politics of Greece and Cyprus, and Middle Eastern Politics.

Modern Greek Literature and Culture

The Program offers courses and seminars on the Modern Greek Language, Modern Greek Literature, and Greek Cinema.

Greek American Studies

The Program offers courses, seminars, and workshops on Ethnic Groups in New York and the Greek American Community.
