

*German Language Courses***German 111: Elementary German I. 4 hr., 4 cr.**

Intended for students with no previous knowledge of German. A basic orientation to German language and culture designed to help the student negotiate simple social situations. Practice in reading, writing, speaking, and listening comprehension. **Fulfills Pathways Language requirement. Zero Textbook Cost.**

German 203: Intermediate German I. 3 hr., 3 cr. Prereq: German 203 or equivalent.

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A continuation of German 203 designed to bring the student to an intermediate level of proficiency. Comprehensive review of grammar, vocabulary building, and reading of cultural texts. **Counts towards the QC German major and minor. Fulfills Pathways Language requirement. Zero Textbook Cost.**

*German Courses in English Translation***German 250W: German Film and Media. 3 hr., 3 cr. Prereq: English 110.**

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Weimar German Cinema. This course will look at various iconic Weimar German silent and sound films of the early 20th century such as *The Cabinet of Dr. Caligari*, *Nosferatu*, *The Nibelungen*, *Metropolis*, *M*, *Dr. Mabuse*, *Blue Angel* and others. We will analyze the extraordinary development of German cinema during a period of great political and economic instability, and an all-encompassing cultural revival. Lectures will be in English; films will be in the original language with subtitles. Students must view the films in their entirety before class and participate actively in synchronous and asynchronous activities. **Fulfills “Writing Intensive” requirement. Counts towards the QC German major and minor. May be taken more than once provided the topic is different.**

German 41W: German Literature in Translation. 3 hr., 3 cr. Prereq: English 110.

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Great Works, Short Texts. This course will focus on some of the great iconic works of German literature (folktales, fairy tales, short stories, poetry) from the late 18th century to the present, by authors such as Goethe, Schiller, Tieck, Kleist, Droste-Hülshoff, Kafka and Hesse. Outside readings will help to situate the texts and their cultural and literary importance within an international context. All readings, discussions and writing assignments are in English. **Fulfills Pathways “Literature” requirement. Fulfills “Writing Intensive” requirement. Counts towards the QC German major and minor. May be taken more than once provided the topic is different.**

Students can complete a QC minor in German with just 18 credits.

REQUIREMENTS FOR THE MINOR IN GERMAN (MINOR CODE GERMMIN)

The German minor consists of 18 credits relating to German language, literature, and culture. Up to 6 credits may be taken in English translation (for example, GERM 41, 45, 250, 310-315). Students should consult with the undergraduate advisor for German as early as possible in order to plan their programs.

Students can complete a QC major in German with just 36 credits.

REQUIREMENTS FOR THE MAJOR IN GERMAN (MAJOR CODE GERM-BA)

36 credits are required for the major. Students must take at least 24 credits from among the language courses (GERM 111–236) and literature courses in the 300 series (GERM 321-360). The remaining 12 credits may be taken from among any other courses relating to German language, literature and culture, including those taught in English (GERM 41, 45, 250, 310–315) and “Eurocourses”. Interested students are urged to consult with the undergraduate advisor for German as early as possible in order to plan their programs.

Students may take courses in Berlin Germany at FUBiS (Freie Universität Berlin im Sommer) for QC credit.
