Russian Language Courses

IMPORTANT: Heritage speakers of Russian are advised to consult with the Russian Undergraduate Coordinator for correct placement before enrolling in any of the following language courses:

RUSS 111 Elementary Russian I (Section 1). 4 hr.; 4 cr. M, W, 10:05-11:55. Sabitova. QH 350F. Class number 42107. This introductory course in the Russian language is based on the communicative approach and lively in-class interaction. We will use one of the best contemporary textbooks and supplementary materials. The goals of this course are to master a basic vocabulary, learn correct pronunciation, the basics of grammar, and cursive writing, and develop the ability to follow spoken Russian in simple social situations. Class work will include four hours per week of practical work with theoretical explanations, various written assignments in and out of class, a mid-term and a final examination. THIS COURSE IS FOR ZERO-BEGINNERS ONLY. Prerequisite for RUSS 112. PATHWAYS credit for the Queens College language requirement.

RUSS 111 Elementary Russian I (Section 2). 4 hr.; 4 cr. T, Th, 10:05-11:55. Pisetskaya. QH 245G. Class number 41956. See the above course description. THIS COURSE IS FOR ZERO-BEGINNERS ONLY. Prerequisite for RUSS 112. PATHWAYS credit for the Queens College language requirement.

RUSS 2143 Intermediate Russian Conversation, 3 hr.; 3 cr. T, Th. 5:00-6:15. Kulimova. Online Synchronous. Class number 42488. Prereq.: RUSS 203 or permission of the department. Intensive practice in spoken Russian. PATHWAYS credit for the Queens College language requirement. This course will also count towards the requirements for the major or minor in Russian. Both heritage speakers and intermediate language learners are welcome to take this course.

Russian Literature Courses in ENGLISH

RUSS 155. Keys to Russian Literature (Section 1). 3 hr.; 3 cr. Cheloukhina. Fully online (asynchronous). Class number 42507. This course studies key works by famous Russian writers (in translation) from the beginnings of Russian literary tradition until the 21st century. Among the writers whose works will be studied are Pushkin, Gogol, Turgenev, Dostoevsky, Tolstoy, Mayakovsky, Bugakov, Pasternak, Akhmatova, Sholokhov, Bunin, Solzhenitsyn, and others. The course goal is to familiarize students with their works and to analyze them from the literary, socio-political, and historical perspectives. This course satisfies the requirements of PLAS RL ET and PATHWAYS credit for Queens College literature. This course will also count towards the requirements for the major or minor in Russian. Lectures and readings will be in English.

RUSS 155 Keys to Russian Literature (Section 2). 3 hr.; 3 cr. Cheloukhina. Fully online (asynchronous). Class number 42505. See the above course description. This course satisfies the requirements of PLAS RL ET and PATHWAYS credit for Queens College literature. This course will also count towards the requirements for the major or minor in Russian. Lectures and readings will be in English.

RUSS 155W Keys to Russian Literature (Section 3). 3 hr.; 3 cr. Permitina. T, Th. 3:10-4:25. In person. QH 245B. Class number 41694. See the above course description. This course satisfies the requirements of PLAS RL ET, PATHWAYS credit for Queens College literature, and College Writing Requirement. This course will also count towards the requirements for the major or minor in Russian. Lectures, readings, and writings will be in English.

RUSS 175 Russian Fairy Tales. 3 hr.; 3 cr. Permitina. Fully online (asynchronous). Class number 42504. A critical study of Russian fairy tales and folk traditions from the beginning to the present, based on contemporary critical theories and methods. Lectures and readings in English. This course satisfies the requirements of PLAS RL ET and PATHWAYS credit for Queens College literature. This course will also count towards the requirements for the major or minor in Russian. Note: This is a fully online course taught via the Bright Space. Lectures and readings will be in English.

RUSS 245 Russian Short Story. 3 hr.; 3 cr. Hybrid asynchronous via the Brightspace, W: 1:40-2:55 In person. Cheloukhina. Class number 41596. QH 010. This course will study the masterpieces of short prose by the famous Russian 19th-21st-century authors. The goal is to familiarize students with a broad range of the short prosaic writings and the lives and works of the authors, as well as to reveal the general tendencies of the development of this genre. The stories under discussion will be placed within the historical and cultural contexts, which will allow the students to comprehend in full the events and characters described by the authors, to expand their knowledge of Russian culture and history, and to relate this knowledge to other world literatures and cultures. This course satisfies the requirements of PLAS RL ET and PATHWAYS credit for Queens College literature. This course will also count towards the requirements for the major or minor in Russian. Lectures and readings will be in English.
