

III. Course Description and Objectives

The overarching goals of this class are to introduce you to the outlines of psychology as a scientific discipline and foster critical thinking about the facts and theories. Psychology is a broad field, and psychological topics are studied from several different perspectives. We will touch on many of the major questions, theories, and research findings of psychology. Of course, since we have only 6 weeks to cover the entire field of psychology, our consideration of most topics must be rather selective and brief. However, after this course, you should be familiar with the basics and be prepared for further study in more advanced psychology courses. I also hope that this course will increase your curiosity and your interest in the field of psychology. In order to make this a stimulating course, you need to contribute your time, effort, attention, and your genuine curiosity. I want your active involvement.

Extra credit (for attending a lecture and writing a brief reaction paper) (OPTIONAL)	 If you attend the lecture (July 19 from 5-6:30pm, room TBA) and write at least 2 paragraphs reaction paper and email it by July 21 to jkyoungstrom@gmail.com you will receive 9 bonus points. • Remember to include your name, KU ID, and class section (265A) on the email. This will be a talk by a North Korean defector comparing universities in North and South Korea and discussing mental health issues, as well as some information on PSCORE organization (a nongovernmental organization with consultative status to the United Nations which aims to raise awareness of human rights issues, performs some rescue operations, and also offers educational support to defectors).	
Extra credit (for making powerpt slide) (OPTIONAL)	 Build a slide that adds new information about a topic discussed in class, focusing on Asian cultures or countries (Korea, China, Vietnam, Singapore, etc.) and comparing them to other countries; You may pick the specific topic If you do more than one slide, each slide must be a totally new topic (if one slide is on TopicA, no other slides on TopicA even if you change the group you're reviewing within that topic) You will receive up to 4.5 points of extra credit per slide (2 slides maximum per person; 9 points max). These points will go into your cumulative exam total prior to averaging the top three exam scores. (So, after dropping your lowest exam score, you could earn a max of 318 points for top 3 exams plus research survey for 9 points, and max of 9 points for a total for 2 extra credit slides. Your total points on top 3 exams plus extra credit will be divided by 300 to determine your average). Slide must include your name, student ID, and correct course section (265A, 265B) Files submitted as .ppt or .pptx by email to jkyoungstrom@gmail.com 	
Extra credit for doing a research survey OPTIONAL	 If you complete the survey (web link provided later) by July 21 (KST) and include KU student ID and class section (265A or 265B) you will earn 9 extra credit points. • The topics included in the survey are personality, creativity, sleep, and attitudes towards mental health. Your specific responses will be anonymous to me, and all I will know is whether your ID has completed the survey. Maximum points available to earn for class = 318 (top 3 tests plus 9 points for each of two different extra credit options) (You may do all three options of extra credit: survey, attend talk/write reaction, and powerpoint slides, but still a max of 18 points of extra credit). Course Average will be determined by adding your top three test scores plus extra credit points (max of 318 points total for tests plus extra credit), then divided by 300. Grades will be posted by student ID. Exams will not be returned to keep. I will leave some time to allow students to review the Exam Key and ask questions on the class day after the exam. Further review of exams may be done during office hours or by appointment.

You will be required to write a 10 page paper on this topic due to me by email by July 25, and this will be incorporated into your grade. It will count for a total of 10 points (Your final course grade will be your top highest 3 exam scores, plus the 10 points for the paper, plus any extra credit points, divided by a maximum of 310 points. For people not doing the paper, the final course grade will be your top highest 3 exam scores, plus any extra credit points, divided by a maximum of 300 points).
