Inspired by Dr. Dána-Ain Davis's Spring 2023 course "Reading Leith Mullings: Black Feminist Materialism for the 21st Century" at the Graduate Center, CUNY, this student roundtable presentation invites students from "Intro to Women and Gender Studies" at Queens College to reflect on their journeys in developing a feminist consciousness.

Students will reflect on their understanding of feminism and feminist political praxis through writing, poetry, song, photo slideshow, video, visual art, collage, etc. This gathering is intended to have students and fellow attendees reflect on their lived experiences, ethics, values, and political commitments as feminist thinkers.
