Per Diem Substitute Teachers:

- Per diem substitutes work in schools providing teaching or adding additional on-site assistance for students.
- Substitute teachers are paid \$193.47 per day for a 6 hour and 50 minute day.
- Substitutes are expected to be on site for the entire school day and follow the schedule of the school.
- Based on the needs of the individual schools, assignments are available on a day-to day or long-term basis.
- Substitutes use an online system to view and accept assignment opportunities that align with their preferences such as geography and school level.
- New substitutes must complete a series of online workshops prior to employment and are required to have fingerprint clearance with the NYCDOE before any employment commences.
- Candidates must possess a Bachelor's degree to be considered.
