### Newman Center

At Queens College, we're proud to support our students by providing spaces and programs that foster faith, community, and belonging. The Queens College Newman Center is a Catholic campus ministry affiliated with the Diocese of Brooklyn and part of the nationwide Newman Center network serving college students since 1883. Located in the Student Union Building, it provides a welcoming space for Mass, fellowship, and faith formation, supporting students who want to learn about or deepen their Catholic faith through worship, Bible study, and community programs.

Also located in the Student Union is the Immanuel Lutheran ministries which offer morning prayer/devotions and bible study and is open to everyone.

Once per semester, Queens College President Frank H. Wu meets with an interfaith advisory council, comprised of spiritual leaders on campus, as well as the Office of Student Affairs and the Office of Compliance and Diversity to discuss potential collaborations between faith-based campus organizations in order to strengthen the bond of the QC community.
